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WAMEGO-MANHATTAN-FT. RILEY TO JUNCTION CITY OFFICERS RUN THE STREETS Carry Torch to Support Special Olympics Athletes

Manhattan, Kan.- It is expected that 1,150 officers from over 97 agencies will carry the "Flame of Hope" throughout 52 counties in Kansas as they travel to the annual Special Olympics Summer Games held in Wichita. The Law Enforcement Torch Run (LETR) is a series of statewide runs which will travel approximately 1,276 miles throughout the state. Law Enforcement Officers, along with Dustin Gunter, member of Royal Valley Panthers Special Olympics in Hoyt, Most Inspirational Athlete of 2015, will light the cauldron to officially open the Summer Games in front of over 3,000 athletes, coaches and fans of Special Olympics Kansas on June 3rd.

Locally, the Torch Run will be **Thursday, June 2nd** and include the communities of Wamego to Manhattan to Ft. Riley and end at Junction City. The route and times starting on 0800 hours are:

- 0800 Start Wamego Sports Complex. **Torch is carried by Pottawatomie County Sheriff's Department**
West on Highway 24 to CarQuest in Manhattan
- 1030 CarQuest, 316 Tuttle Creek Blvd. **Torch is passed to Riley County Police Department.**
Continue on Tuttle Creek Blvd to Leavenworth Street
West on Leavenworth St to 4th Street
South on 4th Street to Poyntz Ave
West on Poyntz to 17th
South on 17th to Ft. Riley Blvd
Continue on Ft. Riley Blvd to Ogden and end at Ft. Riley Gate. **Torch is passed to Ft. Riley Officers**
- 1200 Start Ogden Gate, Huebner Rd., Ft. Riley
Hueber Rd turns into Grant Ave
- 1330 Stop Grant Park in Junction City. **Torch is passed to Junction City Officers**
- 1400 West on Grant Ave, cross over Washington St to Jefferson St.
South on Jefferson St to 6th Street
Stop at Heritage Park (6th & Jefferson) Junction City

Celebrating their 35th anniversary, the Law Enforcement Torch Run began in Wichita, Kansas in 1981 with six runners and has grown to an international program involving thousands of Law Enforcement personnel, raising millions of dollars annually to benefit Special Olympics programs in the United States and abroad.

The Torch Run is the largest grassroots fundraiser and public awareness vehicle for Special Olympics Kansas. Officers volunteer hundreds of hours each year and in 2015 raised \$543,582.96 in support of Special Olympics Kansas programs. This remarkable feat was accomplished by holding events and fundraising through the torch run, special event fundraisers (i.e. Polar Plunge, Truck Convoy), sponsorships and donations.
